Brimfield worked in collaboration with composer Gwyneth Herbert to devise the central choral composition, integrating a participatory, non-hierarchical approach to devising with neurodiverse patients, carers, healthcare professionals and researchers. Songwriting workshops explored aspects of mental illness such as isolation and connection, loneliness and community, anxiety and healing, and the loss, finding and sharing of voice. Common to many shared stories was an exhausting repetitive experience of collapse, slow recovery and relapse without appropriate community support; as a central principle, the harmonic sequences and melodies are structured to assume a looping, cyclical form in response, uniting initially tentative individual voices in the circle to slowly build to a euphoric choral swell before repeatedly fragmenting to dissonance.
